iscal Year 2022/23 saw the Board of Directors make significant progress on several fronts – progress that has set the museum on a firm path toward sustainability.

We are pleased to submit the Annual Report of the New Brunswick Museum for the fiscal year ended March 31, 2023 in compliance with the *Accountability and Continuous Improvement Act*. We are accountable for the preparation of this Annual Report and for the results contained herein.

In April, 2022, we submitted the completed 2022-2027 **Strategic Plan**, which received ministerial approval in February 2023. The Plan comprises four key pillars, which will guide the New Brunswick Museum (NBM) through a period of profound and exciting change:

- 1 Regeneration through new facilities
- 2 A strong and empowered NBM
- 3 A viable and sustainable NBM
- 4 An invigorated Pan-NB approach

We thank the many contributors who offered their thoughts and advice from around the province, and our strategic planning partner, Nordicity, for their support and guidance during this comprehensive process.

In preparation for a major fundraising initiative associated with the NBM Revitalization Project, the Board of Directors

worked closely with the Foundation for the New Brunswick Museum and its Board to develop and sign a **Memorandum of Understanding** that will guide our interaction and clarify roles and responsibilities in the future. I am very pleased with our two organizations' strong and productive relationship.

In July, the NBM received more than \$8 Million in joint funding from the Government of New Brunswick and the Government of Canada, to fund the design and planning phase of the NBM Revitalization Project. The Facilities Committee was particularly active on this front and, during the year, worked closely with staff to develop a comprehensive list of project requirements that would serve as a foundation for decision-making going forward.

In November, the Board was encouraged by the passage of an *Amendment to the New Brunswick Museum Act*. This Amendment invests the Board with the responsibility for facilities revitalization, renovation and rebuilding – laying the governance foundation required for the NBM Revitalization Project and improving the Board's ability to steward our collection over the long term.

This year's most significant step forward was developing a *Request for Proposals for Architectural Design Services* for the NBM Revitalization Project, which was released in January 2023.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER

hallenges and significant progress for the staff and volunteers of the New Brunswick Museum have been marked this year. The decision to close our Market Square Exhibition Centre was a significant, but necessary step to allow staff to focus on preparing the museum's collections for a generational revitalization project.

This project will require multiple moves of our incredible collections and our expert technical staff's intense focus on ensuring our revitalized NBM meets the needs of the public and the collections long into the future.

Moving the collections of an 181-year-old museum is no small feat. Our museum has a remarkable array of objects and specimens captured in its databases, from the extremely tiny to the extremely large and from extremely fragile to the robust. Many of the collections require specialized curation – some frozen, some boxed, some in a bath of ethanol to aid in their preservation. It's not an overstatement to say that each item needs its own customized packaging and moving plan to ensure every object is secure and can be tracked through the entire move process to its interim curatorial space.

NBM staff have thrown themselves into this process, using their skills to make bespoke boxes for fragile items, to wrap and crate larger items, and to protect our province's most precious items as they move into our new interim collections and research space while the NBM Revitalization Project proceeds.

The 2022/2023 fiscal year saw our team manage the move from the Exhibition Centre at Market Square into our Douglas Avenue Collections & Research Centre and other support facilities – while we supervised the fit-up of the Lancaster Avenue location in partnership with the Department of Transportation and Infrastructure. This new location will be home to the collections and research activities during the project's building phase.

When completed in November 2023, the Lancaster Avenue location will host both the collections and NBM staff offices, allowing us to welcome researchers and the public via appointment. It will take approximately six months to move everything into this temporary home.

Although our next fiscal year will see exciting progress on the design of the revitalized NBM and groundbreaking for actual construction, we are very proud of the progress made this year. We would also like to acknowledge the contributions of a team of expert Indigenous and non-Indigenous Certified Archaeological Field Technicians who joined our team at the museum this past year to conduct their research and aid in the curation of the museum's collections.

While this extraordinary experience has been unfolding around them, NBM staff has also maintained a variety of streams of work, including acquisitions, research, conservation work, fieldwork, advising and consultation services, interpretation programming, media relations and

donor relations and more. We
cannot wait to reopen fully to the
public and help New Brunswick communities
share their stories with the world as they visit their
Revitalized New Brunswick Museum.

I want to thank all NBM staff, students and volunteers for their patience and hard work this past year. I would also like to thank the Departments of Tourism, Heritage and Culture and Transportation and Infrastructure for their invaluable support in helping us move closer to our vision of a Revitalized New Brunswick Museum for the next century. We're making this long-awaited, once-in-a-lifetime experience a reality together.





MUSEUM SERVICES

- Planning, preparation and implementation of the dismantling of exhibitions, including packing and moving objects and infrastructure from the Market Square Exhibition Centre.
- Planning, preparation and packing the collections for Douglas Avenue move-out.
- Partnership activities beyond the NBM included a conservation assessment and recommendations for the Coat of Arms on Charlotte County Courthouse, St. Andrews, and the Owen family carriage, Campobello Museum, Campobello.
- Presented a virtual conference poster talk on the conservation and photogrammetry of sub-fossil Quarternary walrus specimens at the NBM for the Symposium of Palaeontological Preparation and Conservation and the Symposium on Vertebrate Palaeontology and Comparative Anatomy, broadcast to an international audience from the National History Museum, London and Oxford University, respectively.
- Provided content for several NBM social media posts, including developing a video featuring the extensive conservation treatment of a model ship.



- Contributed memorial social post for Queen Elizabeth II.
- Humanities Research priorities and policy development.
- Special presentation at the Albert County Museum, Hillsborough, NB, featuring the Privy Councillor's uniform jacket of Prime Minister, Richard Bedford Bennett.²





ARCHIVES AND RESEARCH LIBRARY

- Staff learned the craft of creating phase boxes, which are ideal for housing-bound material for the move.
- Procedure review, and action plan developed for move.
- Remediation of delicate materials.
- Reviewed the uncatalogued backlog of library material.
- Prepared a collection of materials for loan to the Saint John Jewish Historical Museum.

ARCHAEOLOGY

- Completed 89km of coastal survey documenting the condition of eroding cultural sites.
- Worked with NBM Staff to learn the NBM approach to packing and documenting museum collections.
- Archaeologists and field technicians conducted many field visits and inspections at the request of the Government of New Brunswick to support the conservation of New Brunswick's heritage resources.

NATURAL HISTORY

- NBM Research Associate, naturalist, and former NBM Natural Science Curator, David Christie was awarded the Order of New Brunswick.
- NBM research associate Dr. Reggie Webster received the ANHMC Bruce Naylor Award, recognizing exceptional contributions to museum-based natural history in Canada.

- BiotaNB 2022 successfully took place in Kennedy Lakes Protected Natural Area (PNA) east of Plaster Rock. Since 2009, BiotaNB has amassed over 30,000 species occurrence records for NB PNAs.
- A state-of-the-art scientific imaging system was purchased with donor support and is now operational at the NBM.
- ► Footprint fossils from Quaco, NB, now in the NBM collection, were determined by Dr. Lorenzo Marchetti, a German vertebrate footprint specialist, to be late-Permian. They are the first fossils that can be used to age-date the red sandstones in Quaco, the only late-Permian fossil footprint locality in North America.
- Working jointly with the North American Continental Mycoblitz program, the NBM produced DNA sequence data for more than 1,000 mushrooms from the Atlantic region, now in the NBM collections.
- Drawing on the extensive NBM freshwater bivalve collection, workshops on freshwater mussel identification and survey techniques were delivered to the staff of the Peskotomuhkati Nation at Skutik, Eastern Charlotte Waterways and the Department of Fisheries and Oceans.



EXHIBITIONS AND VISITOR EXPERIENCE

- ► In Q1. "Peter Powning: A Retrospective," described previously, was held over five-weeks, welcoming 562 visitors. ³
- ► The Museum Boutique remained open in the Market Square Exhibition Centre until Q3, when it relocated to Brunswick Square Mall, while a second location in the Area 506 Container Village was open from June to November to attract cruise ship visitors.
- The Museum Boutique's online store remained open and active on social media. With the radio campaign for the Christmas season, half of the sales were from outside of the province.
- ► Interpretation staff held walking tours in the Uptown during the summer of 2022.



DEVELOPMENT

- ACOA Rediscovering Main Streets funding helped install the NBM Boutique in the Area 506 Container Village and the main Boutique move. 4
- Funding from Department of Canadian Heritage for collections management and specimen digitization will support NBM's citizen science platform.
- Funding support for multiple Natural History
 Department programs, including BiotaNB and biodiversity technology upgrades.
